My Miracle Therapist



Two summers ago, I could not breathe anymore. I was choking. Rage and confusion overwhelmed me. It was all consuming. How could I be feeling this way? My family was doing well. Life was interesting, full of promise. Working in Tanzania and serving God full-time was a dream come true. I quickly realized that something was wrong...and that I needed help. This anger could not be "normal".

Within days Kristina came into my life. She was calm, articulate, wise, and someone who understood the anger. She was also a therapist who understood the truth behind the smiles, a real answer to prayer. I was safe, but I struggled to articulate the anger and pain I

felt. After all, a "good Christian" isn't angry or bitter - or so I thought. Maybe I just needed greater faith. That's where the answers were. God knows our struggles and our pain. Why do we need to talk about them? Prayer and studying the Word should be enough!

It did not take long for her to figure out what was going on. Within a few sessions it became obvious that I had PTSD - Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. I thought it only affected soldiers and war veterans! To that, she also added, "Strategic Survival Personality" and "Boarding School Syndrome." Big words, but are they actually real issues?

My life, in a nutshell, had been full of adventure and excitement. I had lived in six countries by the time I was 10 years old. During this time I went

to five different schools and learned quite quickly that I had to adapt or not be accepted. In one of the countries, Ethiopia, there was also an ongoing communist revolution. Violence and fear surrounded our life. The sound of gunshots kept me up at night.

"Do you get flashbacks?" Kristina asked. "And what do you see when you get them?" I saw tanks, guns waving, men with guns chasing us, military checkpoints, dead bodies in ditches, extreme poverty and disease. Never feeling safe. Alone. Do I have any happy memories? Sure. Somewhere. After all, my life had been an exciting adventure, right?

Identifying feelings, addressing thought patterns, and learning to express emotion overwhelmed me. I could not absorb what was going on in my head. I felt messed up, walking around the house in circles, and forgetting what I was doing. I started taking prescription medications. I would do anything to get better. I waited, but I started losing sleep. Apathy took over. I was tired, dizzy. I could not drive. Then tremors started. What was happening to me? Why was I feeling side effects without any benefits? Clearly the medication wasn't working.

"We could try a new therapy, by the name of EMDR, Eye Movement Desensitizing and Reprocessing Therapy," Kristina suggested. You go through all of your past and current traumas, and reprogram the pictures you see. "Let's wait a few more weeks," I said. If you ask me, the therapy sounded a little scary. And then I thought, "Maybe I should ask Jesus for help. After all, isn't He the ultimate healer?" I was in full-time mission work, but deep down I knew that I had not surrendered it all. I still held on to

childhood hurts and bitterness. Plus, I had an image to maintain - the "good Christian" image. As a survivor, and as one with chameleon-like instincts, I could make it look good. And I believed the lies I told myself. "This is as good as life gets, serving to the best of my abilities, and sacrificing everything I knew to give. What else could He want?" I knew He had something better for me.

The next altar call at our church had me on the floor, sobbing, for hours. I did not care what anyone else thought anymore. I just wanted Jesus to answer. I felt someone holding me tight. The safety I felt was immense. At that moment the flashbacks started coming back, but now they were different. This time Jesus was in each of the memories. Standing beside me, walking, holding, or sitting, He was always there. All the times where I was alone and frightened, He was there. He performed EMDR on my memories. Miracle therapy!

A few days later I saw Kristina. I was vibrating, but with joy this time. We spoke about what had happened, and her smile got wider and wider. She could see the difference! I was different. The anger was gone. I could not stop smiling. I had fallen in love with Jesus. "Weeping may stay for the night, but rejoicing comes in the morning." (Psalm 30:5b, NIV)

He is still there, every morning. After 40 years of trying it on my own, it took honesty and full surrender to finally get to the relationship I had been craving. The smiles are wider, the praise more frequent, and I know the Word is alive.

Behind the Scenes of Missionary Funding

My sister-in-law Ruut is one of those women who seems to excel at whatever she does. She's an excellent writer and speaker; she can cook and knit. She is a funny, thoughtful, organized and wise woman of God. I am not sure whether there's anything she can't do if she sets her mind to it. Of course, as one who has been blessed with many talents, she also has a lot of responsibilities.

Ruut is going on her third year as the Asia Director for Fida, a Finnish development and mission organization. She is responsible for 17 countries and approximately 60 missionaries, which means that her job is both physically and emotionally taxing. She spends a lot of time flying between different time zones and countries, often many times a month. She is not only responsible for the missionaries themselves, but also their budgets, training, support and safety. Fortunately, Ruut has a regional team that she works with closely in order to keep things running smoothly and efficiently. She is also a member of the Fida board, which meets regularly to discuss, reflect and make decisions. Recently the board has had to make some very difficult decisions in light of recent budget cuts by the Finnish government to development work. In March, we had the opportunity to visit Ruut (and my brother Henry) in Thailand and I asked her a few questions about her work with Fida.

What or who has helped you the most in your work?

Speaking with older (retired) missionaries who have been so open and honest about their experiences has been refreshing and helpful. The discussions we have had on the Fida board have been such a positive experience; free and open communication is so useful. Also, working at a grassroots level with the locals in different countries has enabled us to be more effective and have a much broader impact.

What is your biggest challenge right now?

Pakistan. Although each country has



left a lasting impression on me, Pakistan stands out because the work we have been doing there will no longer be funded by Fida. This is a direct result of government cutbacks. Most people know that there were big cutbacks by the Finnish government to development work. In Asia, this translated into approximately 1.2 million euros being cut from the budget. This has meant downsizing some projects and canceling others. Peshawar, Pakistan, for example, won't be getting any more government money. We have been supporting the women there to learn to read, and to sew. This in turn has allowed Pakistanis there to read the Bible, to follow instructions for giving out medicine, to go to the market; everyday things we take for granted.

We also have a Christian school there, near the border of Afghanistan, which is an elementary school made

up of (minority) Christians and Hindus. We were involved in starting the school a few years ago and it is a great support to the local Christians there. The school is in danger because of cutbacks, but God spoke to me about the importance of continuing to support the kids there. We need to find a way to keep this work going. So, we are hoping to get sponsors through Fida who would commit to sponsoring the school so that we would be able to continue the work there. Although there is no more government money earmarked for this project, if people sign up as sponsors for the school, then we can continue.

How would you challenge us?

I have been thinking a lot about God's mercy and justice; He challenges us to be like Him. And yet, rather than

fighting against injustice, our thoughts are so easily consumed by economic downturns, terrorism, depression and ourselves. We live in a culture of fear and our natural instinct is to try to secure ourselves and our loved ones. We are trying to be as safe as possible and in doing so are hindering our opportunities to positively impact the world. In the west, particularly, we have been given so much. We are blessed. We can certainly afford to help those close to us as well as those farther away. We have the ability to create positive change, but we need to be willing to take some risks and step outside of the walls of safety we've created for ourselves. I challenge people to pray and ask God about whose life He wants them to impact/influence.



Is There a God?



Several years ago, I was at a camp in Thunder Bay spending time in prayer. Someone might ask why pray or even argue that there is no God. Have I ever seen God? Does He desire prayer?

I was thinking about all of this as I prayed, but, then, a new thought came to my mind: when I hear about apples, I will know. The thought made no sense but it caused me to spend more time in prayer. Upon arriving back home in Sault Ste. Marie, someone came crying to me about a person dying in the hospital. When I went to visit the patient with their friend, her husband would not allow us to stay. The next day I returned anyway and when I saw the husband, he told me that his wife had asked for the strangest thing - a dozen apples. Then I told him about my prayer in Thunder Bay. He immediately invited me into his wife's hospital room where she was lying at death's door. When I spoke, she began crying and said she had gotten angry at God many years ago and walked her own way. Bitterness had overwhelmed her and now, facing death, she had no peace. I had words of reconciliation for her about the forgiveness of God; not my own words but from the Word of God.

After I left the hospital I went to my Dad's place. He was writing a book and he showed me what he had just penned in his book that day. One of the phrases he had written was "A word fitty spoken is like apples of gold in settings of silver" (Proverbs 25:11). I believe he was inspired by God to pen those words the same way that I was inspired in Thunder Bay to visit the lady in the hospital.

The Bible was written many years ago.

A lot of people use the argument that the Bible was written by man and there is no God. It is open to interpretation and even misunderstanding. Some might say that maybe there is a God but He is not what the Bible portrays Him to be. To all of these people I would ask: was that verse "A word fitly spoken is like apples of gold In settings of silver" inspired by God or written by man? It does say in the Bible, "All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness." So, could God have inspired the writing in the Bible?

If there was no God, there would be no beauty. Just stop and think of a bird or tree, or even the human body, for example. Would it not be an insult to say that these things just happened? What about love? What about sight or hearing? If there is a God, would He not reveal Himself to His creation? The beauty around us testifies of Him and His love. Would He not let Himself be known? Think of

an ant hill. If you saw an enemy army approaching the ant hill how would you warn them? The easiest way would be to become an ant and tell them that they are in danger. God came to us in human form so that He could communicate with us and even warn us of dangers we can't

Those who know the Bible, know that the whole Old Testament foretells and describes Christ. It was written in Hebrew, centuries before His birth. The whole New Testament, or a large portion of it is Christ's message after He was born

Although many religions exist, if the truth of that message He brought is not twisted, then you can see God revealing Himself; a loving and forgiving God who is long-suffering and whose desire for you is good.

Take Hold of Eternal Life

This column provides a brief overview of God's plan of salvation, and tells you how to be a child of God.

- 1. Every human being is a sinner.
 "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). Sin condemns a person to eternal punishment.
- 2. God loves you.
 "For God so loved the world that He gave
 His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16).
- 3. Jesus is the only savior. "Neither is there salvation in any other, it has no other name under heaven by which we must be saved" (Acts 4:12).
- 4. You need to repent of your sins, ask forgiveness and believe in Jesus' atoning work on the cross, and personally accept Jesus Christ as your Lord and Saviour. When you receive Jesus, you become a child of God. "But as many as received him, to them gave he power to become children of God, to those who believe in His name" (John 1:12). This is called new birth. Except a man be born again, he cannot see the Kingdom of God (John 3:3).
- 5. Pray like this:
 The Lord Jesus, I
 understand that I am
 a sinner, and I believe
 that You died on the
 cross for me. I would
 now like to open the
 door to my heart and
 accept you as my
 Savior and Lord. You
 control everything
 from now on and help
 me to live according
 to Thy will.

If you prayed that prayer with a sincere heart, you are now a child of God, saved, and on your way to eternal life.
